SAIT Trojan men's volleyball team spikes their way to top

With a new coach and a flawless preseason record, the Trojans men's volleyball team is off to a promising start.

After last weekend's eight team preseason tournament hosted at SAIT's campus centre, the Trojans took their record from 4-0 to 9-0.

After winning four straight games, the Trojans went on to punish Edmonton's MacEwan University Griffins 3-0 and take home the medal.

"We're really happy with how the team is coming together, but we still have a ways to go," said head coach Andy Hayher.

Hayher stepped up as head coach in September after Ryan Marsden retired for personal reasons.

Hayher was a Trojan player during the 1999-00 and 2000-01 seasons and along with the team, took home silver in both Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference (ACAC) and Canadian Colleges Athletic Association (CCAA) championships.

Hayher then became assistant coach to Lorry Ingram

from 2001-2003 where they won silver again (twice in ACAC and once in CCAA). Since 2008, Hayher has been assistant coach to Marsden.

"This year we are trying to bring back the culture we had in the early 2000's," says Hayher.

A philosophy of order and discipline might just take this team to the top.

"We know we have a lot of potential on the team this year and would be disappointed with anything less than ACAC and CCAA championships," said Darcee Froese, captain and spiker for the team.

Individuals such as Froese, 2011-12 ACAC all-star, Justin Kilb, 2009-10 ACAC all-star, and Scott Lesher, three year ACAC all-star and 2010-11 ACAC male athlete of the year, make up a portion of this team's veteran talent.

Hayher says that while the team has been playing well, there is still room for improvement.

"We have made a lot of shifts since last year and will need to make more as the season progresses."

The team only needed one point to move on to provincials, and on Sunday, Oct. 14 the SAIT Trojans tied the Lakeland Rustlers 2-2 on home field and punched their ticket to the playoffs.

It was a remarkable feat considering a large part of the roster has been in and out of commission during the season

"It has been frustrating," head coach Grant Stevens said about the team's injuries. "We haven't been able to get a full squad of 11 players to practice together consistently."

"Players quite frequently have had to play positions they don't normally play," said assistant coach Erin Schwab.

With many starters out for the game against Lakeland, including co-captain Caitlin Gallant, it was a tough battle.

"Caitlin is such a huge part of the team and it's just not quite the same without her," said Schwab.

Midfielder Gallant suf-

fered whiplash in a fender bender accident prior to the weekend.

Although unable to play Gallant trusted her teammates to do what was needed.

"Everyone on the team has the skill and the ability to put our team ahead and that's what they did on Sunday," said Gallant.

Although injured, players such as co-captain Breanne Macleod were able to play and gave it their all.

Macleod, who plays striker on the field, was sick with the flu this weekend, had a concussion, and is also afflicted by Compartment Syndrome, a condition that involves increased pressure in a muscle compartment.

Through all of this Macleod still plans on playing through provincials.

Earning their spot in the provincials has the team excited.

With only two wins last season this is a major step up.

"To break the 10-year drought is awesome," says midfielder Kaitlyn Silcox, "and it's been such an enjoyable season I'm glad it's not over yet."

"Not only am I excited for the team, but the coaches too. They put so much time into making us play the best we
